Dave's Diary

Several weeks ago, a church member asked me about the four Greek words for love. When we read passages in the Bible, the English translate all four of the Greek words to one word-love. Without a Bible Concordance, it is sometimes difficult to know which definition is being used. Allow me to explain the different Greek words for love.

Agape means love in a spiritual sense. It often refers to a general affection or deeper sense of 'true unconditional love'. This love is selfless; it gives and expects nothing in return. This is the love that is discussed in 1 John 4 and 1 Corinthians 13.

Eros is a 'physical' passionate love, with sensual desire and longing. Romantic, pure emotion without the balance of logic; Someone you love more than just a friendship. It is the love that can be applied to dating and marriage.

Philia is 'mental' love. It means affectionate regard or friendship in both ancient and modern Greek. This type of love has give and take. It is a dispassionate virtuous love, a concept developed by Aristotle. It includes loyalty to friends, family, and community, requires virtue, equality and familiarity. It is a love that is between family, friends, and or enjoyment of an activity as well as between lovers.

Storge means 'affection' in both ancient and modern Greek. It is natural affection, like that felt by parents for children. It is rarely used in ancient works, and then almost exclusively as a descriptor of relationships within the family. It is also known to express mere acceptance or putting up with situations as loving the child but not caring for their actions; Something most parents have felt at one time or another.

We sometimes find the word love in the Bible where we would not define the situation as love. Perhaps these four descriptions explain and simplify the four Greek words for love.
